Networking is a word that often comes up in career preparedness conversations. In the office of Career Development and Calling we often share the statistic that you increase your chance of attaining an internship or job you apply for by 60-80% if you have a previous networking connection who is able to put in a good word for you. That is certainly a big incentive to network while in college. But what does it even mean to network???

Networking is a broad term for seeking out professional connections within your field/industry *before* you are looking for a job. These connections can provide you with advice, additional contacts, and can help you find out about job and internship opportunities down the road. Networking is really just jargon for *relationship building*, which we all know how to do.

Here are action steps to take to begin building your network!

1) Create a LinkedIn profile and begin connecting with professors, classmates, coworkers, and professional connections you make. Check out our resources page on the Career Development and Calling website for information on how to create a strong LinkedIn profile.

2) Take advantage of extracurricular activities where you can network; like job fairs, community events, seminars, and forums.

PRAYING PELICAN MISSIONS

1) Can you give us a brief overview of your organization?

Praying Pelican Missions is an interdenominational ministry that celebrates the diversity of the Church while leveraging what binds us together. Each year, we set up and lead mission trips for churches, schools and small groups. Our trips are built around three main pillars for healthy short-term missions: genuine partnerships, long-term relationships, and sustainable ministry. By remaining under the authority and direction of the local Church (domestically and abroad) in the communities that we serve alongside, our missions teams are able to support the ministry that is already happening in that community

2) What do your job and internship opportunities look like?

Assistant Trip Leader (Seasonal, Flexible May-August 2023)

This is an opportunity to serve with us during the summer months (and even your spring break) by facilitating both logistic and relational aspects of our short-term mission trips. Develop your leadership skills while being the bridge between the local Church and mission teams, supporting locally-run ministries each week you serve on trips! Serve anywhere from 2-10 weeks.

Vocational Ministry Intern (Internship, January-August 2023)

This internship program is designed to develop, equip, and support Christian leaders in ministry through the planning and facilitating of short-term mission trips. VMIs will assist in things like trip set up and consulting mission teams prior to their time on trips. During the summer, they will spend 6-8 weeks leading mission trips in location, being the bridge between the local Church and mission teams.

3) What do you look for in a student or a new hire applying to work with you?


