

## Summary

In John 3:1-21, a Pharisee named Nicodemus visits Jesus at night to seek understanding about his teachings. Jesus tells him about the necessity of being "born again" to see the Kingdom of God, explaining spiritual rebirth through the Holy Spirit. Jesus famously shares John 3:16, emphasizing God's love and the gift of eternal life through faith in Jesus. A historically significant aspect of this passage is the introduction of the concept of spiritual rebirth, challenging both traditional Jewish views and first century worldviews. A prominent aspect of Jesus' teaching here and later in his ministry is a highlight of the transition from law to grace. Nicodemus' example shows us the importance of seeking understanding and truth, even when it challenges our status quo. And Jesus meets Nicodemus' questions with assurance of God's love and the invitation to a transformative relationship through faith in Jesus.

## For you

- Being "born again" comes in many forms. Reflect on your rebirth. When did you experience a spiritual shift? (If you're still seeking that, pray for it and please reach out to Campus Ministries if you think that would be helpful.)
- Whether it's about being born again or somethintg else, what spiritual question do you have for Jesus? Ask the Holy Spirit to enlighten your mind and heart in that area.
