What are some hurdles to developing disciples?

- 1. Problem: time
 - Perception of lack of time
 - Busyness and schedules
 - Social media, time spent of Facebook, etc.
 - Easily accessible distractions and idols
 - Priorities (issue of the heart)
 - Intentional living how are we using our time?

Possible solutions:

- Tap into social media by setting up a discipleship group on Facebook
- Use technology as a tool to promote and make discipleship accessible
- Use technology in careful, thoughtful and unique ways that look different from the majority culture
- Gather online affinity groups of occupations such as nurses, physicians or engineers
- Use conference calling technology to educate and start a monthly group
- Help people prioritize their time and strategize well
- Serve as a time coach
- 2. Problem: resources
 - How can we determine which resources are good for nonbelievers or seekers?
 - Do we spend too much time focusing on the "workplace as a mission field" without considering the individuals?

Possible solutions:

- Present information in a way that doesn't require a lot of bible knowledge
- Meet people on their level of understanding
- Explain that we are all made in God's image this transcends faith
- 3. Problem: guiding the flock
 - We don't understand the context of those we minister to
 - Difficult to speak truth into someone's life when you don't understand

Possible solutions:

- Learn about the personal and working lives of those you shepherd
- Be a spiritual life coach
- 4. Problem: suspicion of work/life focus
 - People think this is moving away from the gospel message
 - Suspicious about the content

Possible solutions:

- Help others see why this matters
- Develop a theology of work and faith
- Explain how it is integral to the gospel, not additive
- 5. Problem: too much emphasis on theology
 - Focus on head knowledge and learning rather than action
 - This creates little movement toward wholeness

Possible solutions:

- Make sure people know how to connect what they learn with what they do
- Emphasize application
- 6. Problem: narrow vision of holiness
 - Too much focus on spiritual aspects
 - Perpetuates the sacred/secular divide

Possible solutions:

- Move beyond spiritual things to include all of life
- Redefine what it means to be holy
- Set the bar higher not enough to just attend services or classes, but God needs to be incorporated into every part of life
- Understand that our goals of holiness are too small
- Help people know that God is only asking for ordinary, not extraordinary, efforts
