Work with Purpose Sermon Competition: Judging Rubric

A panel of judges will review sermon videos. Scoring will be based on five areas:

1. Clear Structure and Communication Style

- Does the sermon take the listener somewhere? Does the sermon have a beginning or introduction that invites the listener to engage? Does it tell the listener what God has to say about the topic? Does it push the listener toward transformation?
- Does the pastor seem comfortable with presenting? Are there are verbal "umms" or pauses that distract? Is the pastor's use of body movement helpful or distracting?

2. Solid Biblical Exegesis and Hermeneutic

- Does the sermon demonstrate contextual thinking (taking into account both cultural context and literary context)? Does it help the audience see the text in its context, both thematically and historically?
- Is the Bible the foundation of what this person is saying? Is it clear that the authority of the pastor comes from the Word of God?
- Does the sermon help the listener look at the text in ways that are faithful to the original author's intended meaning?
- Is the pastor using biblical text simply to prove her or his own ideas, or is the point of the sermon derived from the text?
- Does the sermon leave the listener with a greater understanding of God's Word as it applies to life?
- If the biblical text is not a focus of the sermon, does the sermon still reflect biblical truth? Is it evident the pastor was preaching to a non-believing audience?

3. Personal Spiritual Formation of the Pastor

- Did the pastor reveal how this message affected her or him?
- Is it evident how this person's relationship with God affected her or his message?
- Did the pastor invite the audience to be spiritually formed by God?
- Was there a personal or communal application for the lives of the listeners?

4. Insightful Understanding of the Audience, Context, or Community

- Is there an audience this sermon would connect with?
- Did the pastor make an effort to communicate in terms that an audience could easily understand?
- Did she or he use language that was accessible to a relatively broad audience?

5. Insightful Understanding of Congregant Evaluations

• Did the pastor thoughtfully address comments, praises, or criticisms from congregant evaluations in her or his written report?
