

Endorsement Description

- I. **Purpose**. The purpose of an endorsement is to fulfill some or all of the following:
 - a. To create a distinctive/unique academic experience.
 - b. To provide students with the opportunity to diversify and enrich their education.
 - c. To develop areas of knowledge and skills that will complement an academic major.
 - d. To achieve literacy in a particular field of study.
 - e. To help students become better prepared for graduate study.
 - f. To develop or enhance marketable skills.
 - g. To offer attractive options for student recruitment.
- II. Criteria. Any proposed endorsement must meet the following criteria:
 - a. Unified by a thematic or conceptual focus that contributes to students' employability or admission to graduate school.
 - b. A small number of credits: ranging from 6-17.
 - c. A clear rationale for how the number of credits and specific courses chosen achieve the purpose of the endorsement.
 - d. No hidden prerequisites.
 - e. Sustainable/scalable without adding to faculty workload.
 - f. A name that is not the same as an existing major or minor.
- III. **Options**. These are additional suggestions/ideas (not requirements) that may be considered when designing an endorsement:
 - a. Include Gen Ed tags.
 - b. Emphasize real world application or skills that employers are looking for.
 - c. Expand on the liberal arts in some way.
 - d. Include a currently existing internship course.
 - e. Include non-credit earning activities (e.g., volunteering or engagement in some other activity).
 - f. Complement an existing major in some way.
 - g. Consider input from industry, professional organizations, or potential employers.

IV. Financial Aid Implications:

- a. An endorsement is not a stand-alone degree. It is an addition to a student's Course Program of Study. Therefore, a student needs to complete a major at Bethel in order for a transcript to be issued honoring the completion of their endorsement.
- b. Endorsements should be sustainable/scalable without extending students' time at Bethel beyond 8 semesters.

V. Process:

- a. Multidisciplinary or cross-departmental endorsements must include approval of all involved departments prior to approval.
- b. Endorsements should take advantage of existing courses with capacity (to avoid increased costs).
- c. Endorsements should include courses that are offered regularly.
- d. Departments determine if students in their major/minor programs will also be allowed to declare a proposed endorsement. The catalog should indicate any instances in which an endorsement is not allowed in combination with a specific program.
- e. Proposals are submitted to Academic Affairs for review and approval, then reviewed and approved by CAA.
